I have been trying to implement a bit more Swedish when I speak, including reading from the Swedish Bible. My hope and prayer is that my language abilities can greatly enhance in 2021. My language studies are much more consistent and beneficial now that I am in language school again.

Swedish for Immigrants (SFI), the Swedish language course provided free-of-charge to all people immigrating to Sweden, utilizes a series of national tests to gauge the progress of the students' language abilities. There are four courses in the program. I (Don) recently passed the third course and will be beginning the fourth and final course after the turn of the year. Once the final course is completed, I can enroll in the next program, which is called Swedish as a Second Language. I am hopeful to finish the final SFI course by March, which is the next time the national tests will be offered. Please pray that all of these things would produce competence and fluency in the Swedish language.

With 2020 coming to a swift end, it seems only natural to reflect back on the year that the Lord has given us. For many, this year has been met with a series of unexpected challenges, many of them stemming from the current global pandemic. Some have had friends and/or family members pass on to glory. For our family, the travel restrictions has been one of the greatest challenges this year. Beverly's uncle passed away in May and her grandmother just passed away a few weeks ago in early November. The current guidelines for air travel make it very difficult to take trips back home. In addition to this, it is currently not possible for our family to travel to us.
